The Rebirth of Vinyl

Buckle up and prepare for a trip back in time! Over the last half-century, the musical landscape has been transformed dramatically, not once, but several times. Picture this: the golden age of vinyl records getting sidelined by the compact and convenient cassette. But, alas, no sooner had the humble cassette found its groove, it was overthrown by the shiny and modern CD. Then, like a plot twist in a sci-fi novel, iPods and MP3 players boogied onto the scene, followed by Spotify and Apple Music subscriptions seizing control of the musical kingdom.

But here's where the plot thickens. Defying all odds, vinyl records, like a

vintage superhero, have made a colossal comeback, once again making their
way back to the limelight as a thriving and sought-after music medium.

Let's rewind to the 1970s when vinyl was king. A staggering 530 million units per year were flying off the shelves! But as cassettes and CDs emerged, vinyl sales plummeted. Earnings nosedived from a whopping \$2.5 billion per year to less than \$10 million.

But even as digital streaming platforms took the crown, a nostalgic yearning emerged. After all, there's a certain magic in holding a physical album, the texture of vinyl against your fingers, which a mere digital image on a screen can't replicate.

- This longing has fuelled a vinyl revival, and over the past 15 years, vinyl has been spinning its way back into our hearts. In the first six months of 2021 alone, an astonishing 17 million vinyl albums found new homes an increase of 86% on 2020.
- Yes, digital streaming still dominates the dance floor, accounting for nearly 90% of music consumption. With digital streaming platforms providing vast libraries of music at the user's fingertips, this comes as no surprise. However, with vinyl rising from the ashes like a phoenix, sales are mounting at record speed.
- This vinyl revival is largely driven by millennials (people born in the 80s and 90s) who are searching for authentic, tangible experiences. A whole new generation is falling in love with this old school charm. They're embracing the ritual of pulling a record out of its sleeve, placing it carefully on the turntable, and gently dropping the needle into the groove. Vinyl brings back the anticipation of flipping an album side, and the enjoyment of listening to an album as a complete work of art, just as the artist intended.

In a world consumed by convenience, vinyl records invite us to slow down, appreciate the artistry, value the physicality, and most importantly, connect with the music on a deeper level. This resurgence is a testament to the timeless appeal of vinyl, proof that in an era of fleeting digital trends, some classics just never go out of style.

About this test

This is a multiple-choice paper designed to familiarise your child with the types of questions they will see in an 11+ English exam.

There are 50 questions which gradually increase in difficulty.

What you'll need

- Printed question booklet and answer sheet
- Pencil
- Rubber
- Timer

How to prepare

Your child should take the test at a time when they feel alert. Choose a quiet area where they can work comfortably without distractions.

Talk with your child about the reasons for taking the practice test. Explain that this paper looks similar to the one they will see in the real 11 plus exam. The questions and answer sheet will help them know what to expect on exam day.

Explain that they might find some of the questions difficult, especially as they progress through the paper. They should work as quickly and carefully as possible.

If they get stuck on a question, they should move on to the next one. If they have time left over at the end, they can go back to any skipped questions. If they have more time left over, they should check their answers.

Taking the test

Your child should mark their answers on the **Answer Sheet**, not in the test booklet. This is good practice for the real exam which will have a separate answer sheet like this.

On the Answer Sheet, your child should record their answers by drawing a clear line through the answer box with a pencil. Mistakes should be rubbed out and not crossed out. The real exam is marked by a computer, so it would not be able to interpret a crossed-out answer.

Timing

It's helpful for children to get comfortable with taking tests under timed conditions. You should allow them **50 minutes** to take the test. Only start timing when they have finished reading the instructions.

If they haven't finished the test after 50 minutes, circle the question they got to, then let them carry on. When you mark the test you'll be able to see how many questions they got right in 50 minutes and how many overall. This will show you whether your child needs to work on their speed, accuracy, or both.

Marking

You can find the answers on the **Answer Key**. Give your child one mark for each correct answer (no half-marks are available in the real test!). Do not take marks off for wrong answers.

Take time to discuss your child's results in a positive and encouraging way. Work through the corrections, what they would do differently next time, and pick out key areas to revise next.
